EVENT: STAFF OF SLAAMB HOST CAREER FAIR FOR LOCAL SECONDARY STUDENTS

With support from Sioux Lookout's Sioux North High School

The Sioux Lookout Area Aboriginal Management Board (SLAAMB) organized a Symposium/Career Fair event on October 13, 2022. The event aimed to introduce the youth and public to career opportunities in trades, apprenticeships, mining, forestry, energy, and service industries. The fair featured a special speaker, entertainment, booth displays, and a job fair. Over 500 high school students, along with participants from other schools and the general public, attended the event. The goals were to raise awareness about educational requirements, employment opportunities, and the importance of Grade 12 Math and English. The fair facilitated connections between attendees and employers, training centres, and educational institutions. Lunch was provided by SLAAMB Catering workers, and 21 employers and businesses showcased their booths. The keynote address by Michael Etherington and a special concert by Chelsie Young received positive feedback. The event was well-attended and well-coordinated, with participants looking forward to the next edition in October 2023.

Learning the Trade: Updates on our Plumbing Training Program

SLAAMB's 4 week intensive program welcomed 2 cohorts of participants to Thunder Bay, ON.

Through our training program, trainees gain in-depth knowledge about various aspects of the trade including: accurate measurement techniques, basic mathematics, information on standard pipe data and specifications and fitting requirement, hand tool operation, copper pipe installation, valve installation, pipe threading, insights into ABS projects, invoicing procedures, ordering materials, and project execution, as well as safety measures for ensuring a secure working environment. Additionally, given the Plumbing Training sessions have been highly successful. In the first session, held from October 7th to November 4th, 2022, in Thunder Bay, ON, all ten trainees successfully completed the four and a half-week program, showcasing their dedication and commitment. In the second session, held from February 20th to March 17th, 2023, eight participants successfully finished the program and received their well-deserved certificates. importance of winterizing techniques in our Northern environment with harsh winter climates, our program emphasizes this aspect of plumbing. Trainees learn effective strategies to prevent frozen water pipes and thermal installation for extreme weather conditions. Trainees also acquire important knowledge about crawl space safety, handling moldcontaminated areas, and implementing mold prevention measures. Upon successful completion of our program, trainees are awarded a certificate of recognition. To further support their professional journey, each graduate also receives a set of tools necessary for their future plumbing work. We are proud to report that our recent Training Director, and Instructor Dennis Richard Tymura for their invaluable contributions to the program. Their expertise and dedication have played a significant role in delivering a comprehensive curriculum tailored to the unique challenges of our Northern environment. Our training program goes beyond the technical aspects of plumbing. At SLAAMB, we remain committed to providing excellent plumbing training. We are dedicated to equipping our participants with the skills necessary for success in the industry. Focusing on both technical expertise and environmental considerations, our trainees excel to make positive impacts in their communities!



Training and Infrastructure Development: Updates and Achievements

We are thrilled to share some of the exciting updates and achievements from the Sioux Lookout Area Aboriginal Management Board (SLAAMB). The following is a comprehensive overview of our ongoing projects and initiatives.

Project Insight: Our project insights are developed through extensive research, statistical data tracking, and needs-based analysis of Indigenous communities in our service area. We have identified several crucial aspects including: the exceptional cost of educating our trainees, which includes travel funding, training pay, and hotel accommodations, the pressing need for safe, supportive, and affordable housing while trainees attend their training programs, and the high demand for skilled laborers, tradesmen, and carpenters in the Indigenous communities we serve. Project Phases: We have meticulously planned and executed our projects to ensure the best outcomes for our trainees and communities. Here's a detailed breakdown of the phases: 2018: We initiated the "Construction Craft Worker Program" in collaboration with LiUNA from Local 607 of the Laborers Union in Thunder Bay, Ontario. Sixteen trainees participated in this program. 2019: We developed the Carpentry Training and Construction Project, incorporating the Ontario Colleges General Carpenter Level 1-2-3 outline. We partnered with Seven Generations Learning Institute to provide a Canadian Carpentry Math Curriculum. June 2019: Sioux Lookout Town Council approved our land purchase agreement. July 9th, 2019: We broke ceremonial ground at 8 First Avenue Hudson/Sioux Lookout after clearing and preparing the land. September 23rd, **2019:** Construction of Residential Unit #1 commenced with ten trainees under the guidance of lead Carpenter Bob Howden and Carpenter Ben Ingram. The Kenora Patricia School Division and

Seven Generations Learning Institute provided valuable support during this phase. July & August 2019: We cleared the land and initiated the form building of 8 First Avenue Hudson. September **2020:** Carpentry instruction for Residential Unit #2 started with six trainees, following the same successful model implemented in the previous project. December 18th, 2020: Carpentry instruction for Residential Unit #2 was completed on site, ahead of schedule, with excellent trainee attendance and teamwork. October 16, 2020: Housing inspectors from IFNA and Northern Chiefs Organizations provided presentations to enhance our understanding of Carpentry and trades, permitting intermittent inspections of each building phase. March 2021: Both duplexes were completed, offering professional and safe living spaces for trainees. Future Projects: As we continue to strive for excellence, we have several ambitious projects on the horizon: A three-story Learning Centre, scheduled to begin on July 12, 2021, will provide a dedicated space for future trades training programs and serve as a training facility for other programs. Shop & Storage А Trades building, starting on July 12. 2021, will offer ample space for carpentry projects and store the necessary tools of the trades. We are delighted to announce that the program culminated in a memorable graduation ceremony at the Forest Inn Hotel on Wednesday, March 29th, 2023. As a token of appreciation for their hard work and commitment, our graduates were presented with a selection of professional hair styling tools. These tools included scissors, thinning shears, clippers, combs, brushes, blow dryers, curling irons, straightening irons, spray bottles, hair clips, barbicide, and various other items. Additionally, both SLAAMB and our instructor generously provided the graduates with special gifts to commemorate their achievements.

Revitalizing Sustainable Practices: The Harvester's Support Grant Program

We are excited to announce the Harvester's Support Grant Program, a 3-year initiative in partnership with ISC.

With the aim to strengthen community traditions by supporting Indigenous Harvesters in their traditional hunting, fishing, and harvesting activities. The HSGP targets 18 eligible First Nation communities under the Nutrition North Program, prioritizing those with the greatest needs. It focuses local harvesters, increasing on promoting community-led activities, and supporting the use of traditional foods. The program consists of three components: enhancing food sharing, expanding community hunts and

harvests, and providing training and employment opportunities. Funding for individual harvesters will be determined by the local Hunters/ Trappers Committee in collaboration with Band Councils and the BEDO. Transparency measures, including a social media site, will be implemented, and a dispute mechanism will be in place. The HSGP will complement existing community programs and initiatives, fostering collaboration for greater impact.

They taught proper knife techniques, guiding students through creating dishes from scratch with the mentorship that instilled an appreciation for the culinary arts. underwent weekly tests. Alana and Lee also nurture professionalism, encouraging certifications such as In Good Hands and CPR for a secure culinary environment. SLAAMB Presents at the 2022 NAN Housing Summit: Insights

SLAAMB had the honour of being invited to the NAN Housing Summit, which took place on November 15-16, 2022 at the Best Western Nor'Western Hotel in Thunder Bay.

The summit serving as the platform for the formal launch of the NAN Housing Strategy, showcased a comprehensive plan consisting of seven stages. These stages encompassed various vital aspects, such as advocating for inclusive housing systems, addressing the health impacts of housing, emphasizing appropriate and sustainable design and materials, integrated infrastructure planning, improving funding structures, governance and policy reform, and capacity development and training. During the event, several engaging discussions and panel sessions were held on a range of topics including: exploring the Rapid Housing Initiative (RH1) by the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation, delving into tendering procurement and project management, providing updates on health transformation efforts, promoting integrated approaches to governance and community planning, examining current and future housing trends in NAN First Nations, and presenting SLAAMB's own successful Carpentry Apprenticeship Training Program in Hudson, ON. In our presentation, we highlighted the recent training sessions emphasizing the importance of SLAAMB's trades training initiatives for our First Nations people in the northern region, acknowledging the scarcity of certified tradespeople available. We received recommendations and addressed questions from the attendees of the summit, focusing on areas such as furnace and wood stove safety maintenance. We recognized the significance of this training as fire rescue services are not readily accessible in our communities up north. Overall, SLAAMB's participation in the NAN Housing Summit provided a valuable opportunity to showcase our commitment to empowering First Nations individuals through trades training and address critical housing issues. We are grateful for the platform to share our successes, exchange ideas, and collaborate with fellow attendees in our collective pursuit of enhancing housing conditions in the NAN region.

Building Economic Capacity: Highlights of the 2022 BEDO Training Workshop in Sioux Lookout.

A successful BEDO Training Workshop in Sioux Lookout, ON brought together First Nations communities to exchange ideas, explore funding options for growth, and foster collaboration for sustainable development in their communities.

In this section we share a summary of the recent Band Economic Development Officers (BEDO) Training Workshop held on September 7 & 8, 2022 in Sioux Lookout, Ontario. The workshop brought together Economic Development Officers from 25 First Nations that SLAAMB serves. The event was a resounding success, fostering connections and knowledge sharing among BEDOs. SLAAMB covered travel, accommodation, meals, and meeting room expenses. During the workshop, BEDOs networked, exchanged ideas, and discussed programs in their communities. They learned about successful initiatives, explored new ideas, and emphasized the importance of timely finance reports to SLAAMB. The presentations included guest speakers who discussed funding options, available programs, and resources for First Nations communities. Topics covered included the new 10-year ISETS Program, budget allocations, wage subsidies, and finance management. The first day featured introductions from SLAAMB Board members, presentations by SLAAMB staff, and a talk by Summaiya Razakazi from Service Canada. The second day included presentations on the Harvester's Support Grant Program, the Northern Food Subsidy Program, and other topics by esteemed speakers. A total of 22 BEDOs from northern communities and a delegation from KKETS in Thunder Bay participated, along with SLAAMB staff and Board Members. Positive feedback highlighted the value of the workshop and the networking opportunities it provided. We extend our gratitude to everyone involved in making this workshop a success.
